The Luck of Roaring Camp

The Luck of Roaring Camp is a short story by American author Bret Harte. It was first published in the August 1868 issue of the *Overland Monthly* and helped push Harte to international prominence. Roaring Camp was a real place. It was a goldmining settlement on the Mokelumne River in Amador County, California. It was home to forty-niners seeking gold in and around the river; it is now a privately owned tourist attraction. I'll outline the story here, but it reminds me of Christmas, read it and see if you agree...

Roaring Camp was supposed to be, according to the story, the meanest, toughest mining town in the entire West. More murders, more thefts—it was a terrible place inhabited entirely by men, and one woman who tried to serve them all. Her name was Cherokee Sal. She died while giving birth to a baby.

Well, the men took the baby, and they put her in a box with some old rags under her. When they looked at her, they decided that didn't look right, so they sent one of the men eighty miles to buy a rosewood cradle. He brought it back, and they put the rags and the baby in the rosewood cradle. And the rags didn't look right there. So they sent another of their number to Sacramento, and he came back with some beautiful silk and lace blankets. And they put the baby, wrapped around with those blankets, in the rosewood cradle.

It looked fine until someone happened to notice that the floor was so filthy. So these hardened, tough men got down on their hands and knees, and with their hardened and horny hands they scrubbed that floor until it was very clean. Of course, what that did was to make the walls and the ceiling and the dirty windows without curtains look absolutely terrible. So they washed down the walls and the ceiling, and they put curtains at the windows. And now things were beginning to look as they thought they should look. But of course, they had to give up a lot of their fighting, because the baby slept a lot, and babies can't sleep during a brawl.

So the whole temperature of Roaring Camp seemed to go down. They used to take her out and set her by the entrance to the mine in her rosewood cradle so they could see her when they came up. Then somebody noticed what a dirty place that was, so they planted flowers, and they made a very nice garden there. It looked quite beautiful. And they would bring her, shiny little stones and things that they would find in the mine, but, when they would put their hands down next to hers, their hands looked dirty. Pretty soon the general store was all sold out of soap, shaving gear, perfume and things of that nature...the baby changed everything.

That's the way it is on Christmas. The baby enters into our lives, and he slips into every crevice of our experience, changing the way we see ourselves, our lives and the world around us. Who would guess that this tiny, vulnerable baby would be the salvation of the whole world?

Transition Update

The Call Process is the church's search process for clergy. Resurrection follows a model outlined by the ELCA involving 7 steps:

1. Current Pastor resigns – Pastor Dwaine retired in May, 2016
2. Begin an interim phase – Pastor Tim will serve as interim pastor until a permanent pastor is called
3. Complete the **Ministry Site Profile** (MSP) – began this process with the Missional Assessment Profile and will continue through conversations with you about Resurrection's ministry focus. **WE NEED YOUR HELP**, so please participate in events, surveys, conversations that will help us explore how God is at work through this congregation. Please share your email address so we can send regular updates.
4. Form the Call Committee
5. Consider candidates – Synod will present candidates for consideration
6. Extending the Call – the Call Committee will recommend a candidate to council who will present the name to the congregation for a vote.
7. Welcome our new Pastor!

The process is underway and requires three things from all of us: **prayer** to discern God's plan for Resurrection, **patience** with the process and each other, and **communication**.

This is an exciting time for us all – we have the opportunity to dream big about the future of our congregation. Watch for opportunities to share your hopes for the ministry at Resurrection.

Readings: Isaiah 2:1-5 & Matthew 24:36-44

All around us people are waiting for lots of things. For what are you waiting? We are waiting for the coming of Christ. Today, do you wait for Christ with the same excitement, passion, and commitment that you might wait for your own baby?

Nov 30th & Dec 4th – Christmas Is . . . Watching for Jesus!

Readings: Isaiah 11:1-10 & Matthew 3:1-12

In Jesus' day, they didn't have glossy ads proclaiming the coming of Christ, they had John the Baptist who was telling everyone to watch and be ready. Today let God's promise catch your eye and get caught up in watching for the coming Christ.

Dec 7th & 11th – Christmas Is . . . Welcoming Jesus!

Readings Isaiah 35:1-10 & Matthew 11:2-11

Are you having guests at your house during Christmas? To be welcoming, you have to be prepared to receive guests. Today, we consider what it means to welcome the coming Christ who acts so that “the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them.”



We have achieved 96.7% of our 2016 YTD stewardship plan.

Fare for All Holiday Packs are coming!!

The November Fare for All sold 696 packages of food this year, which included 325 holiday packs. We also served 324 households. Although this is a lot more than we usually do at our normal monthly distributions, we were a little disappointed in the customer turn out, and were hoping to serve many more households. In comparison, in November of 2015, 980 packages of food were served, including 418 holiday packages, and 486 households were served.

What does that mean going forward? We are asking for your help in promoting Fare for All in our community for the December Holiday sale. Tell your friends, tell your neighbors, hang up a poster a work, any promotion helps! In December of 2015, we had our largest distribution EVER! The St. Joseph Fare for All site broke the all-time record by selling 1,066 packs in two hours. We would like to get close to selling 1,000 pack in December, similar to last year, but we will not be able to do it without your help!

So what can you tell people about Fare for All? Let people know that Fare for All is a non-profit food distribution that takes place monthly in St. Joseph. They sell packages of fresh produce and frozen meats and have prices that range from \$10-30, which is typically 40% off of typical grocery store prices. The frozen meats are typically easily prepared at home and 4 recipes are provided each month to help with meal preparation ideas. Everyone is welcome to attend this distribution, there are no income guidelines or pre-registration require. It is open to everyone who wants to save money.

****The December Holiday Package will include: Spiral cut Ham (6-8 lbs), Whole Chicken (5 lbs), chicken strips, ground beef (2), Mixed veggies (2), and an Apple Pie.**

A HUGE thank you to all of our volunteers that helped at the distribution! We had a seamless distributions and customers didn't even have to wait in line! We had an abundance of volunteers, which included groups from Resurrection Lutheran Church, St. Joseph Catholic Parish, Retired and Senior Volunteer Program, Apollo NHS, Apollo Swim Team, and Holdingford NHS. The Fare for All staff continues to complement our volunteers on their efficiency and customer service! Thank you for all you do!
